



Year 7 Trip to St Paul's Cathedral

On the 22nd and 23rd of April the Year 7 students visited St. Paul's Cathedral. This was a cross-curricular themed trip between the R.E and Maths departments. The R.E aspect was to see religious architecture with a project in mind to design and make their own place of worship. The mathematical aspect was to observe how symmetry is used and why it is incorporated in architecture of this nature. Symmetry has aesthetic properties which are pleasing to look at both in the natural world and then copied by architects in religious structures.



Essentially, the trip had two elements. The main one was to explore the themes outlined above and to answer a booklet of questions where the students walked around the Cathedral floor, observing and noting what they were seeing very carefully. Examples of such questions were; 'What are the names of the quadrilaterals on the main door?' and 'How do the visual images and sculptures help the people pray who have come to worship'.

St. Paul's is famous for its hollow dome which you can walk around called the Whispering Gallery. This was the second aspect of the trip and really interesting from an acoustic point of view. If you whisper into the wall on one side of the dome, then someone on the other side can hear what you said!! Strange but true! Some very brave students and teachers even went higher than the dome itself, climbing some very precarious and no doubt, old staircases! A great view of London was to be had if you were not scared of heights.

After making our way back to school we had a debrief in the canteen where we went through the answers to the questions in the booklet and students explained what their favourite part of the day was. With the weather being good as well, this capped off a really enjoyable and informative day for all involved.
