  - : But just know that you are not alone and together we can help each other




## **Justin Ramos**

### What inspired you to create HANA?

I can't really specify what exactly inspired me to create the story of HANA- it's a mixture of a lot of things (TV shows, anime, books, just life in general). I really just wanted to create a story a younger version of me would've loved to read. HANA being a romance comic is a major factor when it comes to my drive and passion for telling the story. I never really noticed or found any male authors telling a straight up romance story from a male point of view except for maybe John Green. I'd like for a future where the romance genre targets more of the male demographic as it's something I would've loved to see growing up.





## Justin Ramos interview contined...

### Where do you get idea; for each episode?

I've recently gotten diagnosed with inattentive ADHD, which leaves me with a very imaginative mind. Random fictional life scenarios always pop up in my head and I sometimes (not all the time) use these as inspiration for an episode. The series is very character and personality based- meaning that I just go with what comes off as natural when different characters interact. This will lead to a natural feeling storyline. As HANA is also a weekly web comic-I don't have a lot of time to think about my ideas and polish them. I have to go with my gut feeling most of the time and hope that the story plot points I create will connect with future episodes. Writing is by far the most stressful part of the process (in my opinion).

### Do you draw facial expressions from photographs?

Yep- I always tend to use reference images when there's a difficult facial expression I'm not used to drawing. I hardly draw from real life (due to time constraints from drawing a weekly comic) which is something I want to improve on, as drawing from life is by far the best way to learn!

#### When did you start drawing comics?

I've been drawing comics from...when I was around Year 9 or so. I've done comics for school projects and such and even done some past web comics, but they never really got anywhere as they were just done for fun or as a hobby. I started drawing HANA in June 2019, straight after graduating from university, as I wanted something to work on in my free time along with having a retail job as I thought about what I was going to do in the future.

### What is your favorite Anime?

I don't watch a lot of Anime nowadays compared to when I was younger- but my favorite Anime is a show called Anohana. There are a lot of Anime out there I like but just can't remember- it's been so many years since I've watched any! However, when it comes to genre, whether it be anime or not- I tend to prefer Romance/Slice of Life stories. Another good Anime to mention is a show called Bakuman, it's a story about two boys teaming up to create a manga. I remember being super inspired when watching it!

### How did it feel when Hana passed one million views on Webtoons?

It felt incredible! Admittedly, it wasn't as amazing as I thought it was gonna be, as the more you do this sort of work, the more you realise that social media numbers and views don't create long term happiness. So I've come to appreciate more that I have such loyal and supportive readers who take their time to tune in (and continue to grow!) and support the comic every week. The best thing about hitting a million views is to see the hard work and commitment I've put into the project for the last year and a half has paid off!

## For You by Tatsuro Yamashita

It's a genre of music that originated around the 80's when many Japanese people started to get radios for the first time. From this, many artists began to make their own music based on what they heard from the West and this sprung a distinct sound that a lot of people can distinctly say is city pop. Perhaps the biggest artist to come from this genre is Tatsuro Yamashita, a man who is openly incredibly inspired by Western funk and jazz; his albums show this fact clearly. One of, if not his most popular albums came in the form of 1983's 'For You' where he captures the exact vibe that you can see on its uniquely colourful album cover. From the very start you're thrown into the genre of city pop with the amazing opening track Sparkle. Starting with a simple guitar riff and then exploding into a frenzy of slap bass, thumping drums, and an intense horn section. This is then followed by Music Book, which is comparatively far more relaxed track, with it almost feeling like you're lying on the sand of a beach enjoying a nice drink with its laid back but still jazzy and catchy instrumentation.

After a short vocal interlude (of which there are quite a few but they're short and sweet) it is followed by Morning Glory which is a bit more of a slow track but still

describe as "summer-ish" (it's backing vocal chord progression is also us certain popular video game series so that's a fun fact.) After this we're followed by Futari which is a quite excellent ballad, and it really shows Tatsuro's vocal chords. Moving onto the B-side, we're presented by possibly my favourite track on the album Loveland, Island which just has such groovy bass and such a great groove that I can't help but nod my head the entire track as well as making me feel like I'm surfing or something of that sort (I've never been surfing.) The next track once again is a very funky track although slightly less than the previous track. This is then followed by Hey Reporter where Tatsuro's voice is guite distorted, but the rhythm guitar, bass, and drums still keep a good groove going. We're then presented the final track Your Eyes where for the only time in the album the entire track is in English. It definitely feels like a final song when you hear it and is so distinctly 80's it hurts yet is still an almost perfect end to the album. Overall, funky is the ultimate word to this entire album. I'd definitely recommend this album to anyone as it's super easy to like at least one of the tracks in it. It unfortunately isn't on any streaming services, but you can find the whole album on YouTube by just searching the name and artist. You could also buy the album physically if you so please, but I wouldn't recommend it unless you enjoy the album what with my vinyl costing me around £79 and a CD costing around £40. Definitely still an album worth listening to though and I hope you enjoy it!
