

Japan Trip 2023 - Hendon School/Konan High School Exchange Programme

For the first time since October 2019 the Japanese exchange programme was restarted in October 2023. Eighteen students and two members of staff set off on a long flight to Japan, changing at Hong Kong for our final leg to Tokyo.

For the first three nights of our trip, we stayed in the National Youth Olympic Centre, where the Olympic athletes stayed in the 1964 Tokyo Olympic Village. We were all set and refreshed to experience the main cultural hot spots and embrace the sights and sounds that make Japan so unique.

Included in our tour was a visit to amazing cultural hotspots such as Senso-ji Temple, Yoyogi Park, Harajuku and the infamous Takeshita Street. We visited the busiest road crossing in the world in Shibuya where at night this iconic area really comes to life. This is a must-see experience when in Tokyo. Our students loved it.

Sadly, we left Tokyo on Monday morning although we were about to experience another iconic part of Japanese culture: riding the bullet train to Hamamatsu. It was a momentous occasion to be able to see the stunning view of Mt Fuji as we whizzed by at 200mph. It wasn't covered in snow on the way to Hamamatsu but a drop in temperature on the return trip saw it majestically covered in lots of snow. The cameras of all the students on our return trip to Tokyo were furiously clicking away. Mt Fuji is deeply embedded into Japanese culture and it's easy to understand why.



Arriving at Konan High School felt like visiting old friends and it is safe to say it was nice to be able to return to our sister school and continue with this programme which started in 2000. The students were nervous waiting to meet their host students but this nervousness soon passed as the respective students introduced themselves to each other using Japanese and English. The exchange programme was off to the best possible start. After the introductions the Hendon students set off to meet their new families for the week and without realising it at the time, friends for life.

Konan High School had designed a study programme that enabled both sets of students to engage in activities that were designed to help students exchange languages and enhance cultural differences. For example, Hendon students had to speak Japanese to the Konan students and the Konan students had to speak English to the Hendon students. It was pleasing to see so many of our students trying to speak Japanese whenever they got the chance.



We also got invited to Konan High School 'Sports Day' which is organised by the Konan students. No member of staff is involved in the organisation and set up and it is an incredible scene to be part of. It's also very humbling to know that Konan High School delay their sports day by 2 weeks so that Hendon students can take part. Our students took part avidly. They did not have the ideal preparation but they did take part with lots

of drive, energy and commitment and gave it their best. It was a big highlight of the day to hear and see our students being so kindly welcomed and we were included in most of the events, not to mention the opening and closing ceremonies. We even had our own flag for the day and we had our own flag bearer, just like in the Olympics! The sunny skies and 25c temperature added to the wonderful experience of this very special day.

There are too many experiences to recall in this article and it is just a flavour of what on our trip. The after-school karaoke where our students and Konan students were singing songs in either Japanese or English until 6pm in school was something I will never forget. Visiting Hamamatsu Castle and the man with an Eagle on his arm will surely be remembered. Watching Hendon students making their own 'tie dye washcloths' was a true hands on experience where I am sure some of those wash cloths will be hanging proud and prominent in some family bathrooms by now.

After a weekend with their host families the final sad day came -including, saying goodbye to Konan School itself. Tears of goodbye were witnessed as we left but I am sure tears of happiness have been fostered for the future. Some students will have bonds for life and hopefully the return visits by Konan students coming to Hendon in March 2024 will enable the students to develop even stronger bonds. Since our return I know of many students who are keeping in contact with their new-found friends.

Tokyo Disneyland was our final visit and this ended what was a truly wonderful and possibly life changing experience.



We asked some students who took part in the exchange programme what their favourite part of the trip was;

- ❖ Iliya 13.4 - Staying with a Japanese family as you get to experience Japanese culture first hand and seeing the sports facilities and the way all students support each other.
- ❖ Teida 13.1 - Seeing how everyone respects and supports each other. Everyone is polite and there is no litter to be seen anywhere. Going to Konan High School was awesome and I want to go back to the school.

Konan High School students were asked what their favourite part of hosting a Hendon student was;

- ❖ Rama Ishida - My best memory is shopping together. My host sister said, 'I want to go shopping. When we went to Hamamatsu, she enjoyed shopping, so I was happy. I also remember going to an amusement park and riding a roller coaster together.
- ❖ Yoshino Tsuchida - We had a small trip to a beautiful place called Izu. We stayed at a Ryokan (Japanese style Inn) and ate a lot of good food.

To be able to spend two weeks in Japan and experience their culture and their way of living, first hand, was so amazing. We spent the first 2 days at the NYC (National Olympic Memorial Youth centre) where we had our own rooms and a communal bath and living room. Our first full day was on Saturday and the first thing we did was to visit Meiji Jingu which is a famous shrine, not far from where we were staying and it was the first real part of Japanese culture we got to experience.

I think we were quite lucky as we saw about three marriage ceremonies taking place with the bride and groom dressed in very expensive 'kimonos' followed by all their guests which was a wonderful sight. After that we went to Harajuku where there a lot of clothes shops for young people and a 100 Yen store.

Throughout Saturday and Sunday, we spent our time exploring the famous and yet diverse areas of Tokyo such as Shibuya, Asakusa and Akihabara. I was lucky enough to go to 'ochiya no mizu' which is most famous for their love of music and is scattered with shops selling different instruments. It was so amazing to see. This place was a lot less crowded than Shibuya and was overall a very peaceful area.



On Monday after a final bit of sightseeing we left Tokyo and boarded the Shinkansen heading towards Hamamatsu. Within our journey we were lucky enough to get a close-up view of Mt Fuji. The overall ride to Hamamatsu took about an hour and a half.

Our time at Konan high school and with our host families was definitely one of the best parts of the trip as all the students were kind and welcoming and let us do activities

such as; sports day, karaoke and after school clubs which really gave an insight to the life of Japanese students, especially during lunchtimes where everyone would rearrange their desks together to eat lunch in the homerooms'. You could really see how close all the students were with each other. I think we can all agree that the thought of living with our host family was quite nerve racking at first, but after meeting them and experiencing so much with them you realise that you were scared for nothing.

Our hosts were kind and welcoming and took us all over Hamamatsu to see many places and restaurants. Another student said that their most memorable experience with their host family was visiting 'Bentenjima' which is a red torii gate floating in the water. They saw this at sun set. Seeing the different colours adorn the sky was a major bonus for them. During the week the Hendon students with their host students went to the big shopping mall in Hamamatsu city. It had a variety of different shops and a large super market that sold many sweets! We then went to this hamburger steak restaurant where they even finished off preparing the steak right in front of you and then drizzle an amazing onion sauce on top. This was definitely my number one favourite food place throughout the whole trip (minus my host families cooking, which was amazing).



On our last school day in Konan High School, they arranged an excursion for us where we got the opportunity to visit Hamamatsu Castle that was surrounded by beautiful forest scenery and even walked past a man walking around with an eagle mounted on his arm!

Monday arrived and we left our host families and Konan High School and boarded the Shinkansen again as we went straight to Tokyo Disneyland. Even though it was a school day the resort was heavily crowded, and the majority of us only managed to get on two rides but walking around the park and seeing the Disney characters as we tried out some more Japanese food out was an experience in itself.



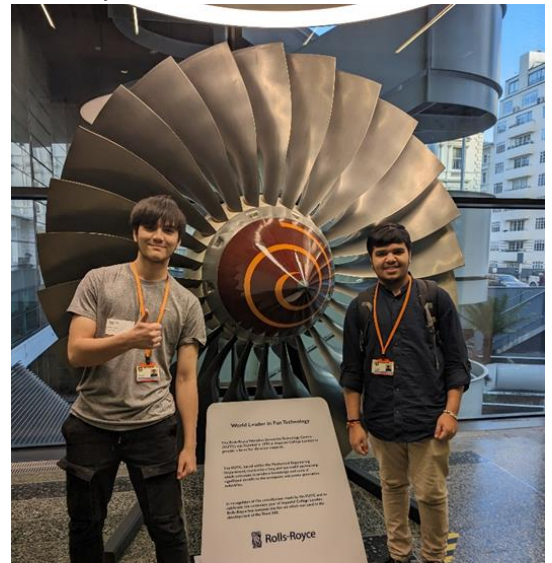

To end our time in Japan we visited another huge temple. It was the biggest temple we had seen so far on the trip. It even had a lake with a huge turtle statue and live turtles swimming around. We were given a few minutes to do some last-minute shopping around the temples which had some interesting shops that sold; jewellery, yukatas, and many different souvenirs for tourists.

In the afternoon we finally arrived at the airport to board our flight and although it was a shame to leave, I couldn't have asked for the trip to be any better and am really grateful for the experience as well as the opportunities to host in March.

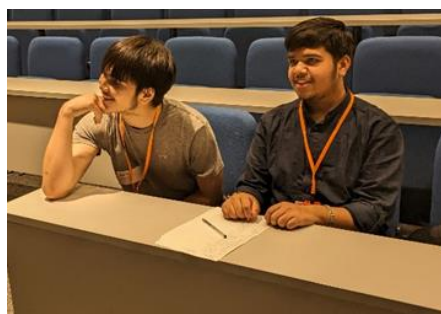

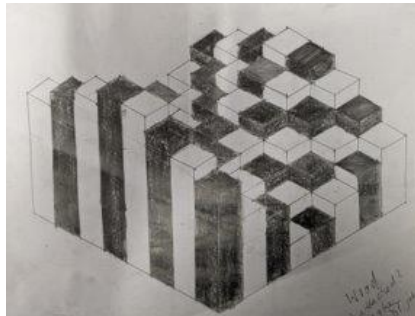
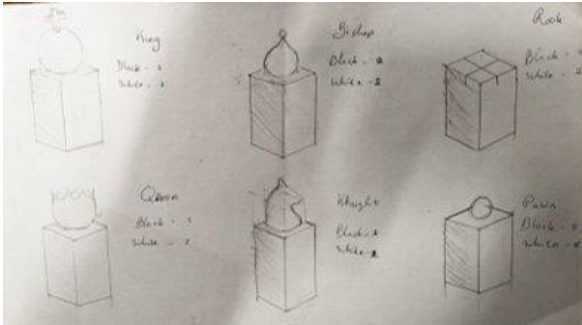
